News from the Park Administrator

It's June! I wondered what observances were celebrated this month. When I looked it up on the Better Homes & Gardens site (bhg.com), I found there are many—not only monthly observances, but weekly and daily ones as well. There are four monthly causes that caught my eye. All of them relate to our health and well-being: 1) Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness, 2) Men's Health, 3) Cataract Awareness, and 4) Great Outdoors. So, make this a month aimed at improving your health.

June 1 also marks the beginning of the hurricane season. In the past, the Polk County Fire Department has conducted a hurricane preparedness meeting to help us better prepare for storms and any aftermath we may experience. This year, Kathy from Polk County Fire Rescue will be conducting the preparedness presentation. Come to Hood Hall on June 13 at 10:00 a.m. to learn what you need to do to prepare for the season.

At last, work can finally begin at the outflow of the Jordan River! TECO has relocated all the lights and power poles that had delayed the project. The next step will be to begin demolition of the concrete structures currently in place. Once that is completed, we can begin laying new culverts to better control stormwater flow at that end of the Park.

It was recently reported to me that someone fed the alligator at the pond. Remember, it is not only illegal to feed alligators, but also extremely dangerous! If alligators become accustomed to getting food from us, they get acclimated to humans and begin to anticipate food when we show up. If there is no food, they may view us as food and attack. By the way, feeding alligators presents such a danger to park residents, that I will report such activity to the Fish and Game Commission for their intervention. After an investigation, the person who was feeding an alligator may receive a fine or jail time.



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Last month I mentioned that we needed cleaning and maintenance personnel. Please welcome our newest housekeeping staff member, Pat Wagner. Pat lives outside the Park, on Cherry Road, and has been a frequent attendee at the monthly Cars & Coffee. Initially, she provides cleaning services in the Guest Rooms and Hood Hall. We still need maintenance personnel, however. Two qualified people are considering applying for a position. Hopefully, I will be able to introduce them in a future newsletter.

Many of you have been wondering about the progress on the purchase of the property north of the church. Although we are still in the early stages of the process, I am happy to report that a Purchase Contract has been delivered to the owner of the property. We have not yet received a signed agreement from the owner but be assured that he is reviewing it. He and I stay in close contact and will continue that as we proceed. I do want to remind you that we are receiving donations toward the purchase price and costs associated with the purchase. If you wish to donate, send a check with a note on the memo line, "Donation for Property Purchase."

Wherever you are this month, I encourage you to focus on your health and well-being. Enjoy the great outdoors! Learn how to reduce the chances of developing Alzheimer's. Get your eyes checked for cataracts (if you haven't already). Men, maybe take walks while enjoying the great outdoors—that can improve your well-being and health. Have a great June.

They are used by over 40 Protestant Denominations.

Book Review

As a library we have been blessed with rich donations given to us by our own people.

"Becoming Mrs. Lewis" explores the life and work of Joy Davidman, a bold and brilliant woman. It is carefully researched, beautifully written, deeply romantic, and fiercely intelligent. It is both a meditation on marriage and a whopping grand adventure. Touching, tender, and triumphant, this is a love story for the ages." —Ariel Lawhon, New York Times bestselling author of I Was Anastasia

Poet and writer Joy Davidman began writing letters to C. S. Lewis—known as Jack—she was looking for spiritual answers, not love. Love, after all, wasn't holding together her crumbling marriage.

Everything about city New Yorker Joy seemed illmatched for an Oxford intellectual and the beloved writer of Narnia, yet their minds bonded over their letters.

A Note from Pastor Chuck...

Those April showers that bring in May flowers have failed to show up as we now enter June. Of course, by the time you read this God may have sent plenty of rain.

In April I announced that I would be retiring in September.

The process for Light and Life Free Methodist Church follows:

Superintendent Mike McAvoy has been in contact with Sylvia Stevenson who is our lead Delegate to the Southeast Region Conference (SRC). She was provided with a printout of the procedures that will be followed in assisting with the appointment of LLFMC's next Pastor. This involves a Transition Team from LLFMC to give congregational input.

The Transition Team has been established with guidance from the SRC. The local Board of Administration placed two on the team to represent the BOA. Our three Delegates are also part of the team. Three others have been selected to represent other segments of folks who attend the Church.

The members of the Transition Team are:

- Delegates: Sylvia Stevenson, JoAnne Thomas, Gene Lewis,
- BOA Representatives: Bob Cannon and Tom Boda
- Music Director: Carol Hines-Brown,
- At-Large Representative: Gail Cook
- Off-site Representative: Earl Wright.

The local BOA was also challenged by the Superintendent to work on the Church's purpose, vision, mission, and values. As the Board nails down these four areas, they will be able to present our church's vision when talking with whomever the Superintendent will present as a possible Pastor to this Church.

If the Team agrees with the Superintendent and SRC Ministerial Appointments Committee that the Pastor would be a good fit for LLFMC they will so inform the Superintendent.

If the Bishop agrees, he will then make the appointment. This is an adapted Appointment/Call process though officially we are an Appointment system.... meaning The Bishop could appoint someone other than the one suggested by the Conference.

A footnote: The Trustees have received a quote on a new sound system. The soundboard/mixer, microphones, speakers and more has an estimated cost of around \$34,000.
