News from the Park Administrator

Whew!... The last several weeks have been busy. And, with all the activities that are available, you probably feel that way too. I love that there are so many different things for residents to do. Sure..., you might have to pick and choose, but it may give people who have not been involved something they would be interested in.

The residents at 5580 Deeson Road have all left the property we plan to purchase, which was a condition of closing the sale. I have contacted our attorney, and he has completed the title work and a closing date has been set. When closing has taken place, I will let you know our next steps.

You might have noticed that several of the residents have relocated to the dirt road beside the property. Doug Jones and I have had several conversations with them. When I asked them about moving, some said that they do not have a place to move to. Please pray that they will find a place.

The gate is still malfunctioning. We had a company from Tampa troubleshoot the gate, and they determined that the sensing coils were old and should be replaced. That work was completed a short time ago. Unfortunately, it hasn't stopped the gate from malfunctioning unpredictably. We are in contact with the company for further investigation.

We kicked off many projects for this season at the Sugar Creek Gang organizational meeting in February. The goal is to have several projects running concurrently so that as many of the twenty-plus projects as possible can be completed. The two big projects are to inventory the water lines in the Park (as required by the government) and to start rebuilding the stormwater infrastructure at the end of the Jordan. These two projects are already underway. There are many smaller projects that are planned. Some of those have even been started like relocating the lights on the office/guest room building. This is in preparation for enhancing the building with decorative framing around the doors. There is no cost to the Park for the framing since it was donated.

The water line inventory has begun. We had several residents volunteer to help with that. They will be locating your shutoff valves so the material of the pipes connected to the valves can be identified. You may be asked to help find the valve if it cannot be located easily. They will also take a picture of the valve so we can submit that with the report that is due in October.

The survey of the eight acres across from the office has been completed. We now know the location of four corners of that parcel. We plan to install barbed wire fencing on the north and east sides of the property so that people in the Blackwater development have a better understanding of where their property line ends. In the past we have had some four-wheeling happening on this piece of land, and we hope to discourage that.

The Board has authorized several projects to which you can make donations. If you are able, consider helping to fund one of these projects: 1) chairs & tables in Hood Hall, 2) the purchase of 5580 Deeson Road, 3) the improvements to the pickleball court, and 4) installation of a new tennis court.

I encourage you to get involved with something at the Park. If you don't know what is available, stop by the office for a calendar or a list of activities. Enjoy your time at the Park!

Stamps for Missions

All donated stamps are sent to Alliance Stamp Ministry in Fort Myers where they are sold to dealers. The money is sent to a publisher in Buenos Aires, Argentina where they publish Sunday school material in Spanish that are sold to at least eight Latin American Countries as well as Spain and the They are used by over 40 Protestant Denominations.

We recently received some postage stamps that had been in a family's possession for many, many years, even a postcard with the stamp still attached. When you downsize, move, clean out a residence when settling an estate, etc. remember to **BE ON THE LOOKOUT** for postage stamps, new or old, domestic, or foreign, and postcards with without stamps.

Leave at least a 1/4" border on ALL sides. Get into the habit of opening either the left or bottom side of envelopes to protect the stamps and that border as they then increase greatly in value. The mission programs that benefit from the sale of these stamps will be grateful.

If you already have or find stamps without the recommended 1/4" border and/or with no paper backing, please turn them in at Hood Hall also; they'll be appreciated, just won't generate as much income for missions' projects.

There's no harm in asking your children and grandchildren to save the stamped envelopes for

you when you mail their Easter Cards

A Note from our Pastor

Over the past month we have been talking about dropping our stones and instead following the lead of Jesus and washing feet. I have had several deeply meaningful conversations with members of our congregation about the tension they feel and the issues they face in their relationships and even in their own families as they navigate loving people who are broken, and in some cases those who have even hurt them personally. I know this process is not easy. In fact, I think it's nearly impossible to do it on our own. But nothing is impossible with God. When we are obedient to forgive a person who has hurt us, or even just engage a person who we would normally push away from, we are trusting God to meet us in those situations to give us what we need in the moment. When we are obedient to surrender what we need to in our flesh The Holy Spirit will accomplish in us that which we cannot do ourselves.

I am reminded of a story I read many years ago on this very subject from Corrie Ten Boom. The story impacted me deeply so I would like to share it with you and challenge you to allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you through it.

When we are willing to drop our stones and forgive and engage even the most unlovely people, that is when we will actually experience the reality of what we say we want in the Lord's prayer when we say. "Thy Kingdom Come and Thy will be done on Earth as it is in heaven.

Here is Corrie's story.

Corrie herself was put to the test in 1947 while speaking in a church in Munich Germany. At the close of the service, a balding man in a gray overcoat stepped forward to greet her. Corrie froze. She knew this man well; he'd been one of the most vicious guards at Ravensbrück, one who had mocked the women prisoners as they showered. "It came back with a rush," she wrote, "the huge room with its harsh overhead lights; the pathetic pile of dresses and shoes in the center of the floor; the shame of walking naked past this man."

And now he was pushing his hand out to shake hers, and saying: "A fine message, Fraulein! How good it is to know that, as you say, all our sins are at the bottom of the sea!"

And I, who had spoken so glibly of forgiveness, fumbled in my pocketbook rather than take that hand. He would not remember me, of course — how could he remember one prisoner among those thousands of women?

But I remembered him and the leather crop swinging from his belt. I was face to face with one of my captors, and my blood seemed to freeze.

"You mentioned Ravensbrück in your talk," he was saying. "I was a guard there... But since that time," he went on, "I have become a Christian. I know that God has forgiven me for the cruel things I did there, but I would like to hear it from your lips as well. Fraulein" — again the hand came out — "will you forgive me?"

And I stood there — I whose sins had again and again to be forgiven — and could not forgive. Betsie had died in that place — could he erase her slow terrible death simply for the asking?

The soldier stood there expectantly, waiting for Corrie to shake his hand. She "wrestled with the most difficult thing I had ever had to do. For I had to do it — I knew that. The message that God forgives has a prior condition: that we forgive those who have injured us."

Standing there before the former S.S. man, Corrie remembered that forgiveness is an act of the will — not an emotion. "Jesus, help me!" she prayed. "I can lift my hand. I can do that much. You supply the feeling."

Corrie thrust out her hand.

And as I did, an incredible thing took place. The current started in my shoulder, raced down my arm, sprang into our joined hands. And then this healing warmth seemed to flood my whole being, bringing tears to my eyes.

"I forgive you, brother!" I cried. "With all my heart."

For a long moment we grasped each other's hands, the former guard, and the former prisoner. I had never known God's love so intensely as I did then. But even so, I realized it was not my love. I had tried and did not have the power. It was the power of the Holy Spirit.
