News from the Park Administrator

As most of you have probably heard, I submitted my resignation at the August Board meeting to be effective October 31. Gloria and I plan to continue living in the Park—as long as the average temperature in northern locations doesn't go below 50 at night! A large part of my decision was due to some physical issues that I believed would hinder me from doing my best for the Park, and that it would be better for me physically to slow down just a tad.

Several weeks ago, we collected and sent in ten water samples to be tested for lead and copper, which is required every year. I am happy to report that all the samples came back as undetected!

Recently we have had flooding across the road leading to the trash area. So, people won't have to drive through inches of water, the regular trash dumpsters will be in the RV/Cabin area. When we believe the rains will be less daunting, they will be returned to their normal location.

Several people have received emails from me recently about the lack of trimming around their residences. In case you do not know or have forgotten the rule (see rule I.e.2), members are responsible for the trimming around their residences even when they are not here. With all the rain we have had recently, the grass and weeds are growing like, well, bad weeds. If you do not have someone trimming around your residence, please arrange for that right away. If you do not know of someone to call, call the office, and we will give you the names of people or companies to contact.

The lead service line inventory is coming along nicely. We have 86% of the water valves photographed. We still need to determine the general location for all valves. Since we did not know we needed this when the photos began, it is not as far along with the photos. In addition, all the collected information needs to be entered into a spreadsheet or located on a map.

That work is still in the early stages. The spreadsheet is due to the Health Department by October 16. The mapping is due by the end of the year.

We had our first real taste of a hurricane last month. Debby was a tropical storm most of her life and in her journey picked up loads of water—some of which she dumped on us. The Jordan and the gator pond overflowed closing some roads to traffic. However, as far as we can tell there has been little damage to residences. We are still early in the hurricane season. If you are in the Park anytime during that season, remember to keep plenty of water and emergency food supplies on hand. Visit www.ready.gov/plan for more you can do to be ready when a hurricane heads in our direction.

Thank you for the many prayers that have been lifted up for us. We appreciate them greatly. If I have been of value during the time I have been here, it is due to your prayers and God's strength and wisdom.



Office News

Well, "Debby" made her way through FL and left 7 inches of rain in Lakeland. There was some minor flooding in and around the park. We have enough water now and don't need another hurricane or tropical storm for the rest of the season.

We are preparing the rooms, cabins, and RV sites for the winter season. We have had to replace some old AC units and get some dehumidifiers so we can prevent mold issues. The bath house showers were repainted this summer by Andrew Sinsmyr.

Stamps for Missions

Library Notes

Please keep in mind that children should **not** be taking books or DVDs out of the library on their own. They need to be signed out by the **host family**, members of the park only. They need to be returned to the drawer in the counter at the front door, not put back on the shelf.

It is very important to leave the checkout cards in the box on top of the counter and not take them with the book. This is the only way we know where the books are.

Please do not loan out books you have signed out. If they go missing, it is the name on the card that is responsible for the book.

Please do not take books out of the return drawer before they are checked back in. We lost at least 10 books this past year because of this issue. The people who sign out the books get upset when they receive notices of late books they have already returned.


Back to School" for the Missionary Kids!


