## News from the Park Administrator

The rainy season has finally arrived with nearly predictable afternoon and evening rainstorms. I was starting to wonder when (or, if?) the rains were coming to fill our pond and the Jordan. Well, the rains came; and the waterways are filling up; and with that, the wildlife that had traveled elsewhere have begun to return. Recently, I've seen a wood stork and a blue heron; a big turtle surfaced in the pond (where was it staying?); and, although they hadn't disappeared, there is at least one smaller alligator hanging out. I love living in Florida and being in the Park!

With the returning rain, mowing becomes a challenge during the summer. The Park staff and a few volunteers keep the acres of grass mowed, and it grows faster than the traffic moving on Kathleen Road! Some areas, in fact, must be mowed twice a week. However, we do not trim around your residences. So please be sure that you have someone who is trimming the weeds and grass around your home. If I see something that needs attention, I will let you know.

This summer, the Board began meeting every two months via Zoom to stay current about things happening in the Park. The next meeting was August 1 at 9:00 a.m. For these meetings, Zoom invitations will go out the day before the meeting, so look for that sometime in the late afternoon or early evening the day before the meeting. If you are able, please join in. If you need help joining Zoom, please find someone to help you ahead of time (check with your grandchildren—they will know what to do).

Things remain unchanged regarding the property that we are interested in purchasing. Continue to be in prayer about this possibility.

The construction of the bridge behind the library is progressing very well. The curbs have been poured, and once the concrete has cured, our volunteers and staff will pour the concrete for the deck. The bridge should be open and ready for use when the new season is in full swing.

Your Board of Directors met in June by way of a group "Zoom" call on the computer. It is a very good method to keep in touch with the Park when we cannot be there in person. Discussion was held on staffing needs in the office and park and general plans for the summer. Some of the projects planned are as follows:

The Library bridge is being widened and re-designed for less restriction in the water flow during heavy rains. Also, the foundation for the bridge in the new sidewalk from Shiloh Path to the pool will be poured and ready for completing the sidewalk this next season.

Also, in the works is a plan to provide emergency generator power to the offices during times when the power is off.

The money is sent to a publisher in Buenos Aires, Argentina where they publish Sunday school material in Spanish that are sold to at least eight Latin American Countries as well as Spain and the US. They are used by over 40 Protestant Denominations. It costs \$9.60 to mail a shoebox full of stamps.

Try to leave at least 1/4 inch or more around each stamp or strip of stamps.

They now collect picture post cards both unused and used. If used, please leave the stamps on the cards. Thank you.

#### After Math

by Terri Blackstock

Terri Blackstock has written another suspense thriller! Her books, to me, are well-written with a definite lesson to learn. It is a suspenseful story, sweet romance, and rings hope for the future. Her books are easy to read and difficult to put down. Her novels are Christian mysteries that have a balance of suspense, an intriguing, thought-provoking topic, a bit of romance, and a compelling, uplifting message.

Thus, *Aftermath*, is a book worth reading. Why? It provides a great story that is apropos for today. There is a political rally and a concert. Three best friends attend together. Then there is an explosion, and only one friend survives. Can you imagine the trauma such an event would have on the surviving person? Guilt for being alive, shock because it happened, and unable to deal with the flashbacks that cause her to relive those moments. With likeable and relatable characters it hits all of the emotions. *These issues are wrapped up in a message of hope and healing. Life is scary and hard, but we are not alone. How we live this life matters and having faith when it seems impossible provides not only the hope we need to persevere, yet is also what will see us through.*

This book explores through characters eyes, such issues as mental disorders, cancer, terrorism, fear and trauma, mental health, grief, loss, along with faith in trying situations and forgiveness and human frailties.

When police stop Dustin Webb with a warrant to search his trunk, he knows there's been a mistake. He's former military and owns a security firm. But he's horrified when the officers find explosives, and he can't fathom how they got there. He knows he didn't put them there, who's trying to frame him?

Jamie Powell, a criminal attorney, was Dustin's best friend growing up. They haven't spoken nor seen each other since he left for basic training, Dustin thinks of Jamie when he's arrested. Jamie knows she's putting her career on the line by defending an accused terrorist, but she'd never abandon him. Someone is framing Dustin to take the fall for shocking acts of violence . . . but why?

#### Nancy Wake: World War Two's Most Rebellious Spy

by Russell Braddon

By Russell Braddon was born in Sydney in 1921. He wrote a number of biographies, novels, histories, and his own POW experience.

This true story about Nancy Wakes, one of the greatest spies during World War II, was told to the Russell Braddon by the woman herself. The author gathered so much information through multiple interviews that he was able to put together a very detailed sequence of events. He provided an inside view of daily life with the men who worked tirelessly to overcome a formidable enemy without a lot of gory details.

Nancy Wake was an affluent woman and wife in France. The war to her was far away until her husband was called up for military service, Nancy felt she had just as much of a duty to fight for freedom and she did! She joined the SOE and became a Special Operations Executive, CEO, a spy! The extraordinary courage of this woman changed the course of the war.

Nancy was so good in being a spy that by 1943, her fearless undercover work had earned her a place on the Gestapo's 'most wanted' list. Nancy often frustrated the Nazis in whatever she did, from smuggling food and messages to the underground Resistance, to parachuting into the heart of the was to lead 7,000 Resistance fighters.

The events of this book are true, The book was originally published in 1956 so close after WWII ended. Therefore, many of Nancy's friends and colleagues were living to recount their close feelings and the broad spectrum of events together to the author whom they trusted. Her main accomplishment brings together situations in WW II France that Many people would not know.

### A Note from Pastor Chuck...

There is an underlining principle in following Jesus in being surrendered and generous. These two ideas get intertwined. In Luke 21:1-4, the good news says, "As he looked up, Jesus saw the rich putting their gifts into the temple treasury. He also saw a poor widow put in two very small copper coins." (NIV). No matter the economic standing of the individual there was an expectation of acknowledging God's gracious provision.

God calls us to be generous. His word tells us all we have comes from Him. I have found that our flesh sometimes finds it hard to "let go and trust God." Knowing who our provider is while recognizing, again, all we have comes from Him, why is it many times so hard to be generous with His stuff?

When we are able to release control of His gifts to us, it allows us to be generous. "For God so loved the world [He made] he gave his only begotten son...". God so loved His creation He surrendered His son to do what needed to be done to set us all free to become whom he created us to be out of His generosity.

God gives us the active opportunity to surrender a portion of His provision and be generous. As demonstrated in Luke 21, wealthy or poor, we acknowledge Jesus and the work of His Spirit in many ways including our tithes and offerings.
